ALL ENTRY FORMS WITH ENTRY FEES SHOULD BE RECEIVED BY THE SHOW SECRETARY BY 5pm ON MONDAY 21st AUGUST. ONLY MINOR AMENDMENTS TO AN EXISTING ENTRY WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER THIS TIME.

The hall will be open for staging from 6.30pm until 9.00pm on Friday 25th August and from 7.30am until 9.15am on the day of the Show.

All exhibitors must have left the hall by 9.15am on the day of the Show.

The hall will then be closed for judging and will open to the public at 1pm.

Prize money can be collected from the Treasurer after 3pm on the day of the Show. Prize money less than £2 and not collected by the conclusion of the Show will be retained in the funds of the Society.

No exhibits may be removed until after the conclusion of the presentation of awards and trophies which will be not before 4pm. Exhibitors must collect their exhibits before 5pm.

Exhibitors are requested not to use articles of value when staging their exhibits. All exhibits should be staged as attractively as possible.

Awards and Trophies to be presented in 2023

Banksian Medal

A Banksian medal will be awarded to the exhibitor gaining the highest aggregate number of points in Section A - Flowers and Section B - Vegetables.

Section A - Flowers

A Challenge Cup, presented by the late Mr E.C. Bellis, will be awarded to the exhibitor gaining the highest number of points in this Section.

Section B - Vegetables

The Shepherd Challenge Cup, presented by the late Mr W.G. Shepherd, will be awarded to the exhibitor gaining the highest number of points in this Section.

Section A – Flowers and Section B – Vegetables

The Nat Maurice-Jones Bowl and £50 will be awarded for the most meritorious exhibit in Section A and Section B.

The Cam-yr-Alyn Bowl, presented by the late Mr & Mrs Holmes, will be awarded to the exhibitor who has gained the highest aggregate number of points in Section A - Flowers and Section B - Vegetables with a minimum of three prizes in each Section.

Section C - Novelty

The Alistair Smellie Rose Bowl will be awarded to the exhibitor with the heaviest pumpkin. The Reddrop Challenge Cup will be awarded to the exhibitor with the heaviest marrow.

Section D – Novice

The Geoff Butler Memorial Trophy will be awarded to the exhibitor gaining the highest number of points in classes D1 to D4 - Flowers

The G Maitland Phillips challenge cup will be awarded to the exhibitor gaining the highest number of points in classes D5 to D8 - Vegetables

Section E - President's Class

The President's Shield will be awarded to the winner of this class.

Section F – Honey

The Rossett WI Trophy will be awarded to the exhibitor gaining the highest number of points in this Section.

Section G – Wine

The Ross Wallis Challenge Cup, presented by the late Captain Ross Wallis, will be awarded to the exhibitor gaining the highest number of points in this Section.

Section H – Craft

The Elsie and Emlyn Jones Memorial Challenge Cup, presented by Mr and the late Mrs J. A Parker-Jones, will be awarded to the exhibitor gaining the highest number of points in this Section.

The Lady Clements Jones Cup will be awarded to the most meritorious exhibit in this Section.

Section J - Cookery

The Society Challenge Cup will be awarded to the exhibitor gaining the highest number of points in this Section.

The 50th Anniversary Challenge Cup, presented by the late Mrs K. N. Evans, will be awarded for the most meritorious exhibit in this Section.

The Agnes Salter Cup will be awarded to the winner of Class J12 (WI Class)

Section K – Floral Art

The Bernard Walsh Challenge Cup, presented by the late Bernard Walsh, will be awarded to the exhibitor gaining the highest number of points in this Section.

The Shordley Challenge Cup, presented by the late Mr T Millington, will be awarded to the most meritorious exhibit in this Section.

Section L – Junior

The Llyntro Trophy, donated by Mrs Hilda Walton, will be awarded to the child gaining the highest number of points in classes L1 to L4.

The Investiture Trophy will be awarded to the child gaining the highest number of points in classes L5 to L8.

The Eric Randles' Memorial Cup will be awarded to the best exhibit in the Junior Section.

All Sections

The Shallcross Rose Bowl will be awarded to the exhibitor gaining the highest aggregate number of points from all Sections.

Show Regulations 2023

The show will be conducted with the rules and standards contained in the RHS Horticultural Show Handbook except when under this schedule they do not apply or are modified.

- 1. All Sections, except the President's Class, are open to all exhibitors. Trade are excluded.
- Any plant, flower, fruit or vegetable exhibited must be the property of the person in whose name it is entered and must have been grown from seed by the exhibitor or been in his/her possession or cared for by him/her for at least two months prior to the date of the show.
- In order to be satisfied that the conditions governing competitive exhibits are fulfilled the Committee reserve the right to visit, by commission, before or after the show, gardens from which material has been entered for competition.
- 4. In sections A and B two or more persons may not enter from the same garden or allotment
- 5. The Committee reserve the right to refuse any entry and in the event of such refusal shall not be required to give any reason or explanation.
- 6. All exhibits should be correctly named. Errors in naming will not disqualify, but the judges will regard correctness and clarity in naming as telling in favour of an exhibit in close competition.
- 7. The judges shall have the power to award, withhold or reduce the prizes at their discretion and their decision shall be final. The Committee reserve to themselves the decision, which shall be final, on any other point in dispute.
- Any protest must be made in writing, with a fee of £1, and delivered to the Show Secretary by 2.30 p.m. on the day of the show.
- 9. After judging has taken place no exhibit or part of an exhibit may be altered or removed until the end of the show except with the express permission of the Show Secretary. The end of the show is deemed to be after the completion of presentation of the trophies and awards.
- 10. Items not collected within a reasonable time after the end of the Show will be kept by the Show Secretary and, if not claimed within one month, will be disposed of, with the exception of perishable items, these will be disposed of after 24 hours.
- 11. Exhibits must conform precisely to the wordings of their class.
- 12. No polythene sheeting may be used on staging.
- 13. Space allowed will be strictly enforced.
- 14. Any plant that has won a first prize in the previous year's show cannot be entered.
- 15. Exhibitors must provide their own Vases, Bowls, etc. A Vase is a vessel whose height is greater than the diameter of its mouth. A Bowl is a vessel whose diameter is at least equal to, but usually greater than its height.
- 16. No challenge trophy may be taken away without security for its safe return and each must be returned to the Show Secretary before the 1st of August the following year. Exhibitors must insure all trophies against loss and damage.
- 17. Points value of prizes: 1st 5 points | 2nd 3 points | 3rd 1 point. An exhibitor receiving an equal first, second or third will receive 5, 3 or 1 points respectively. An exhibitor may enter more than one exhibit in one class but will only be entitled to receive one cash prize and one points award.
- 18. In the event of a tie in any section for premier awards the exhibitor with the most first prizes will be acclaimed the winner.
- 19. Any competitor who has won the Banksian Medal in the last two years is not eligible to win this award.
- 20. All exhibits, personal property, etc. shall be at the risk of the exhibitors and the Society shall not be liable for compensation for loss or damage from any cause whatsoever. Should the show not be held for whatever reason no exhibitor shall have any claim on the Society. Exhibitors shall be wholly responsible for any claims made by their employees under any legislation that may be deemed to apply. The Society accepts no liability for injury or any claim whatsoever from exhibitors or their agents or employees.
